### **Diary of a Lune Valley Vicar by Mark Cannon**

#### **Lent and Easter**

By the time you read this, I will have filled the vicarage bath with Cadbury's Giant Dairy Milk Buttons and I will be bathing away. However, as I type away, it is the middle of Lent and chocolate is forbidden.

**Sunday:** I am preaching on the Forty Days of Lent, but I have also brought with me to Wray Church a large chocolate cake which, if left in the Vicarage, will be devoured by me alone. I explain that there are 47 days from Ash Wednesday to Easter Day, so Lenten Sundays can be looked on as holidays, help yourself ... and, by gum, they do! Wray does not boast an enormous congregation but what is there is highly skilful in cake-eating. Double portions are carried away for "later" and the plate is bare.

**Monday:** In the office my colleagues (every one female; no one to discuss rugby or beer with) are highly amused by the idea of a mere man giving something up. They are on perpetual diets and are used to the idea of sacrifice. I don't like to point out that these "diets" are visibly unsuccessful, but I do, and I am now forced into a second Lenten discipline. Under pain of a 50p penalty, I must not be rude about any colleague.

**Tuesday:** a very boring day at work. Nonetheless a ginger nut is not a chocolate is it? I owe the fund £1.50.

**Friday:** A charming client is making a new will. She has worked hard all her life. "Go on a cruise, Mum", urges her daughter. But

no, it's all to be saved and passed on for the family; all her life this lady has denied herself, and has given to others. That's the point of Lenten sacrifice our denial should bring richness to others. "Not being nasty to Colleagues Fund" now stands at £4.50 after I laughed at some ill-advised fashion choices on "dress-down" day.

**Saturday:** We take two friends from the "other side" to a village quiz up at Lowgill. First off, no alcohol permitted in case the children are set a bad example, and our table and the one next door have to hide our bottles in case the children (youngest participant is approx 30) are upset. Then the questions take on a very local flavour – Who is the Chair of the Lowgill Sheep Appreciation Society? Who lost a bullock last Michaelmas? Etc etc and our friends from Yorkshire stare in amazement. Fortunately, all the locals get them wrong as well. Quizzes aren't supposed to be endured without a cheering cup of summat warm, and we don't even win a prize in the raffle. That's £24 gone as will never return. But is my attitude once again focused on what I can get out of something, what I can take from my surroundings and not what I can give? If I manage to keep my chocolate vow, I can send the cash to charity. Sometimes it's worth sacrificing a little of ourself to give to others. On Good Friday, the returns are enormous.

### St Peter's, Leck

#### Work and repairs done or to be done

The church has a very difficult and complex design on top of the tower; this has led over the years to water ingress because of problems with drainage leading to dampness. The water got behind the plaster on one wall inside the tower so the plaster has been removed and the wall pointed.

The walls have been painted inside after the cracks had been repaired and made good.

The outside guttering has been cleared out and both the guttering and the fascia boards have been painted. The lightning conductor has been serviced and re-fixed, all connections and fittings have been earth tested and a test certificate has been provided on completion. The roof slates have been repaired, the ridge tiles re-sealed and defective duck boards in the valley gutters have been removed.

Once the weather improves the louvres on the tower will be painted, re-fitted and resealed with mesh wire to keep out the birds.

#### Women's World Day of Prayer Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> March, prepared by the women of Malaysia

Fifty people attended this special service. The church was beautifully decorated by the children from Leck school who had made paper chains, flags, pictures and tie-dyed bunting. Hornby brownies had also drawn some pictures which were on display. Twenty three children from the school attended the first part of the service which started with a song accompanied by drums. Lady Ann Shuttleworth led the service and the speaker was Dr Ann Dawson. Catering was provided by the Village Shop and Cowan Bridge Tea Room. A total of £241 was raised from the collection, £120 of which was Gift Aided. Warm thanks are expressed here to everyone who helped in any way, with special thanks to the children. ED

## VISITING CHURCHES

### St Andrew's Church Burnley: an inner city church.

St Andrew's sits on a traffic island on the north side of Burnley at Duke Bar on Colne Road. It was built in 1866 (during the Cotton Famine). Now it has joined with two other churches making one parish. Like the other churches, it was built in response to the growing need for town churches in Burnley. St Andrew's was close to a mine and to mills.

Today, even with its spire, it's hard to find and hard to get to: you circle it twice in a car (or more if you are me) wondering how to get off the main road. Might it not be easier on foot, is a thought that passes through my head. And, with all the rows of low-rise houses in neat streets, what a contrast of choice with ours at home: to walk to church from Lowgill over the little river bridge and up the 'setts' or to drive round by the leafy lane?

By our standards, St Andrew's seems "high church". It was originally built in the Early English style by an architect from Manchester who had done many public buildings, offices and factories and about 50 new parish and district churches. About 30 years later, at the suggestion of the vicar to provide more sense of space, Austin and Paley, architects from Lancaster, came in and added an apse to contain a stunning reredos, a back drop to the High Altar. This was the work of a well-known designer, Charles Kempe and was made in Oberammergau in Germany, just as it would have been made in the fifteenth century, all of wood.

I first saw St Andrew's when I went to photograph a Diocesan Opportunity Fund project, a race-relations day organised by "The Bridge". There one Saturday, I was aware of a faithful group of people of all ages, having fun in the parish room, making things together. I went into the church and it was jolly and colourful, brightly decorated with children's work. The tall, tiered reredos was shabby though: it needed a face-lift. The churchwarden there said they wanted to do something about it.

Some years later, the Guy Barton Trust for encouraging good decorative work inside churches had a request for help from St Andrew's, and they set things in motion by finding a specialist who confirmed that the reredos was indeed of very high quality, and certainly worth doing up. So it was that, very slowly, money was collected in a far from wealthy parish and, with the help of the

Heritage Lottery Fund, the reredos was restored. Part of the deal was that people in the parish should be involved, and so they were. I went to see the finished work last autumn and it gleamed! The lovely wooden Saints had been repaired, repainted, and regilded with gold leaf, all this to the high standard and under the eye of the specialist. The church had been painted throughout and there were displays showing the lively groups who use it, the Mother's Union, the School, the Scouts, Guides and the upcoming younger ones. It was quite clear that the shine and the colour within St Andrews is attractive to all those in the Duke's Bar part of Burnley, of all races, and neighbouring Muslim people were as joyful as anyone about what had been achieved. There was a proper all-day Lancashire 'Feast' to celebrate. The fresh samosas were as delectable as the cakes and scones.

## Pentecost: Sealed by the Spirit

The Feast of Pentecost [or Whitsunday] celebrates the first Pentecost when the apostles received the gift of the Holy Spirit from the risen Lord. The story is well known [Acts 2:1-4]. The apostles were gathered together after the resurrection and ascension of Jesus, uncertain about what to do and fearful of the future. Suddenly the power and authority of God overwhelmed them. They experienced a new sense of the God-given nature of their mission and of the calling of the whole Church to serve and follow Christ. The Spirit had come to remind them of Jesus' teaching and to give them new hope, just as Jesus had promised before his ascension [John 14:26, 15:26, 16:7-11, 13-14].

The Holy Spirit is not an impersonal force or power. It is God himself. Our God is Father, Son and Holy Spirit. At Pentecost the apostles experienced God as Spirit, just as Jesus had received the same gift at his baptism in the river Jordan [Matthew 3:16]. The same Spirit moved over the face of the waters at the creation [Genesis 1:2] and overshadowed the Blessed Virgin Mary at the annunciation [Luke 1:35]. The Holy Spirit is the creative power of God, giving birth to our world and to our saviour. The Spirit also inspired and empowered the prophets of the Old Testament, sending them out to proclaim the coming of God's kingdom. The coming of the Spirit heralds

the end of the old age and the beginning of the new age of the kingdom:

'And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions' [Joel 2: 28].

In the New Testament too the coming of the Spirit is a sign of the fulfilment of all things in God's final kingdom. The Holy Spirit of God therefore points us to both the beginning and the end of all things. Quite literally he is in the world's beginning and its end.

Christians are privileged to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit in baptism and confirmation. In these sacraments God comes to us just as he did to the apostles on the first Pentecost. Those who receive this seal of the Spirit inherit the same gift and receive authority for their calling as Christians. The sacrament of confirmation also unites us with God as the Lord of the future. In confirmation we are made citizens of the heavenly Jerusalem, the kingdom without end. Although we are called to serve God in this world and in this age, in the Spirit we are already taken up into the new age of God's final kingdom.

**London to Rome Sponsored Cycle Ride

The cycle route chosen is about 1,100 miles and will be covered in 13 days. Beginning in Trafalgar Square on 27 April 2012, the ride ends in Rome, via France, Switzerland and Aosta in Italy. We hope to post a daily blog on our Justgiving web page.

There will be a support vehicle provided by Askam Construction and Jim Nicholson, who speaks Italian, will be the driver.

We will be entirely self-financed and, therefore, every penny raised will be for St John's Hospice.

**About St John's Hospice:** "It costs us approx. £3 million to run every year, of that we must find £2 million through voluntary donations. This equates to almost £38,000 a week, or £5,400 a day through voluntary income. Due to our current financial deficit it is vital that the community continues to fundraise for us in order to ensure our survival as a charity for future generations.
