### Diary of a Lune Valley Vicar by Mark Cannon

Our sandwich shop which offered a 'full English' for £1.99 recently closed and that just leaves a Tesco and an excellent chip shop. So, off I go - large chips and curry sauce £2.40. I have it all worked out under my rigorous calorie counting diet that it amounts to 550 calories so there is still room for a morsel or two later. Isn't this diet lark so easy? With a bit of luck it will also be someone's birthday and under the Iron Law of Office Life, they have to provide cake. One slice = 200 calories; no problem.

**Nunc, maintenant, jetzt ... subito!**  
**'Come here, now!'**

Perhaps you have said that to one of your offspring, but have you ever wondered how long 'now' lasts?


In the English dictionary 'now' is defined as 'at once.' The trouble is that 'now', when you have said it, has gone and another 'now' has taken its place. Could 'at once' mean 'in the blink of an eye?' For most people that occurs in about one third of a second. However, nature works very much faster than we do. In 'a blink of an eye,' molecules in the cells that make up the eye vibrate ten billion times, and for each molecular vibration, electrons make a million orbits; so one electron orbit occurs in a very short time. Even shorter are the orbits of protons and quarks. The infinitesimal limit for a time interval is known as 'The Planck Time.' For any reader who has studied Science or Mathematics, The Planck Time, in seconds is ten to the negative power of forty three. Written as a decimal that is:-

0. 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 000 1

[14 groups of three zeros]

Perhaps that is a real 'now.'

At this point you might look up at the sky in exasperation. There could be stars visible. What you see is like an enormous history book. For example, the star Rigel in the constellation of Orion is eight hundred and sixty light years away. This means that when we look at Rigel, what we see is the light that was emitted from Rigel eight hundred and sixty years ago in 1155AD and which has only just arrived.



Some galaxies are only just delivering their images millions of years after the original light was emitted. During that time they might have ceased to exist. We cannot see the universe as it is 'now.'

A similar effect occurs within us, in that our brains take time to receive and process information from our senses. So, what we think of as 'now' actually occurred a few tenths of a second ago.

Samuel Butler in 1872 wrote a satirical romance in which he describes a Utopian Society where the manners and values are the reverse of those in England. Crime is considered as a disease whereas disease is considered as a crime. Machines are abolished because of the fear that they might become masters of the land. Rubbish ... isn't it? He gave his book the title EREWHON. One anagram gives NOWHERE. Alternatively, for those machines he wrote about HERE NOW!

A different definition of 'now' is 'the present.' Perhaps, with a little twist in

meaning, 'now' is a 'present' from God so that the Universe and life can exist. But, how did God construct time? As one lady recently said to me, 'I believe in miracles.'

Another lady, in a magazine article, considers that 'now' lasts for a few seconds: a day would have about thirty thousand 'nows.' A part of her reasoning is the fact that movie-makers seldom ever produce a 'clip' lasting less than three seconds unless they deliberately wish to create confusion.

'Come here, now.'

'Yes, mum, but I can't manage the first "now," will the second one do?'

**Women's World Day of Prayer  
'Receive children. Receive me'  
Friday March 4<sup>th</sup>, 2.00pm at St Wilfrid, Melling**



This year our service has been put together by the Christian women of Cuba. The Republic of Cuba is one of the world's last remaining Communist states. The First Secretary of the Communist Party is also the President of Cuba, serving for a term of five years with no limit on the number of terms of office. The only government body is The National Assembly of People's Power. Only very recently have diplomatic relations with the neighbouring United States been restored.

After the revolution in 1959 people who practiced any religion were marginalised by the government's atheist policy, but in 1990 everyone was guaranteed religious freedom, enabling people to return to the public practice of faith.

Many congregations had survived through the extraordinary work of women, who had taken on the leadership roles when many pastors had been conscripted or had emigrated. In most Cuban congregations today women have leading roles.

The Roman Catholic Church is the largest denomination, reflecting the country's Spanish history. During the 19<sup>th</sup> century a number of Protestant churches were established and now there are over 60 denominations. Islam, Judaism, Spiritualism and New Christian Religious Movements with fundamentalist tendencies are also present now.

The Order of Service for the Day of Prayer has been translated from its original Spanish into more than 60 languages and 1,000 dialects so that people throughout the world will be using the same service over a period of twenty four hours, beginning in Samoa and ending over American Samoa. By then an estimated 3 million men, women and children, in 170 countries and islands, will have prayed with and for the people of Cuba. In Great Britain alone some 6,000 services will have been held.

Do join us at our local service if you can.

David Newey's guitar style is unique and unrivalled encompassing both the flatpick and fingerstyle techniques with power, fluency and control. David often blurs the boundaries between acoustic and electric styles, coaxing out sounds normally associated with rock and roll, jazz and country and placing them within his more folk based playing.
