


It would appear that there has been a church on this site for at least a thousand years, although most of the present building dates back to the fifteenth century and was much restored in the nineteenth.

The church is built on the first high ground above the flood plan of the River Wenning, just north of a river crossing. There is some evidence that a stone built church existed before the Norman Conquest of 1066. Unfortunately almost nothing now remains of that Anglian building, although the small blocked window in the porch would appear to come from this time. It can also be inferred from the Domesday Book (1086) that a church building existed on this site. In later Norman times the church possibly became a chapel of ease to St Wilfrid, Melling, perhaps served by monks from Cockersands Abbey.

By the 1880's the church had become dilapidated. The Revd Arthur Wellesley Foster took a leading part in the subsequent major restoration. The sons of William M Foster of Hornby Castle fulfilled their father's wishes to restore the church after his death and work was undertaken at a cost of £3,269.

Does God help us .....

**Monday.** ‘Why have I been left alone?’ asks a bereaved lady. ‘Why couldn’t God have given us a few more years?’ Well, it’s not the easiest of questions, and I only popped in for a slice of cake, but what can you say? This is a world where people suffer and die, what exactly are we asking God to do? Presumably, no one would ever fall ill, and no one would ever die if God suspended the laws of nature. And why would He do it for one child, and then, not for a beloved grandfather? In a dynamic and lively creation, we have to expect that growth and life go hand in hand with death and disease. At least, the Church can offer Good News about new life after death and a new kind of existence beyond this one.

**Thursday.** Having said all that, where was He at the Church -vs- Chapel Cricket Battle? I’m sure all good Anglicans were praying for the right result, but were their prayers heard? No. Clearly, the Lord was wearing a Chapel scarf.

We, Anglicans, were relying on experience and cunning for this match since the majority of us had entered our late youth with plenty of padding and upholstery. We didn’t want to be doing a lot of running or bending. By contrast, the chapel team was full of lythe gazelle-like figures wearing Lancashire 2<sup>nd</sup> XI t-shirts etc. Some of them even had their own bats! We were hoping for an angel or two to help out, but we spent a lot of time in other peoples’ hedges looking for balls that had been propelled with mighty Methodist power high into the summer sky. They scored 123, we got 53 in reply (and 30 of those were agricultural extras bowled by burly farmers, so they scored more for us than we did ourselves!)

**Friday.** My colleague, employment lawyer, Tony, from Wigan, has lodged a claim against me and the Church for personal injury. **Dating Easter**

Easter was very late this year—only a day earlier than its latest possible date of April 25th on which it will next fall in 2038. It is all the more noticeable for coming only three years after the earliest Easter for some years in 2008 when it fell on 23rd March: it will not be as early as this again for more than a century. For many folk, and not just practising Christians, the date of Easter and its attendant Bank and school holidays are matters of no little importance. But no one can tell from year to year, without consulting a calendar, when Easter will fall. Given the readiness with which we make advance arrangements for taking family holidays and keeping celebrations it is perhaps surprising we have lived with this inconvenience so long. The willingness of secular authority to put up with the idiosyncrasy of Easter is all the more surprising in view of the lack of uniformity in celebrating the Christian feast. As is well known, the Orthodox church, both Greek and Russian, continues to use the Julian calendar which both calculates fixed dates, like that of Christmas, thirteen days later than our western ones but also uses a different method of calculating Easter; the combination of these differences often separating the celebrations of the feast by five weeks or more (as in 2013 when our Easter is on 31st March whilst the Orthodox celebrate on 5th May by our calendar just four days before our Ascension feast!).

The church decided to celebrate the Resurrection or Easter on the first Sunday after the relevant full moon; the paschal (or Passover) full moon. The occurrence of this full moon which determines the date of Easter is now that occurring on or after March 21st. There is a detailed and lengthy explanation as to how this is worked out. Please contact me if you would like a copy.
